
Our weekly service continues to be a cornerstone of worship and fellowship, bringing together people of all ages and backgrounds in praise and prayer.



A Valentine's Day Note

Did you know that neither Saint Valentine nor his day are in the bible? "Valentine" was a common sur name during the Roman Empire. There were actually two church leaders from that time that have since been deemed saints by the catholic church; February 14 recognizes one of them.

According to Scripture and Lutheran beliefs, however, all believers, whether dead or alive, are saints cleansed in the blood of Jesus. Paul wrote to living believers, "saints who are in Ephesus." (<u>Ephesians 1:1</u>) He also spoke of the believers in heaven and their inheritance, "inheritance of the saints in the light." (<u>Colossians 1:12</u>)

While Lutherans do not recognize or revere saints in the same way that Catholics do, Lutherans still celebrate Valentine's Day if they choose with friends and loved ones.
